Dear Friend,

Thanks to you, Family Services made a lasting impact in 2025. We continued our mission to support people, strengthen families, and nurture safer, healthier communities where everyone has the right to thrive, with our work grounded in four pillars: **Safety. Healing. Growth. Hope.**

Thanks to you, our communities, homes, and loved ones are safer.

Supporting Survivor Safety

Survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and other crimes called our hotlines 5,648 times, and our advocates created 9,307 safety plans.

Preventing Gun Violence

Our SNUG team mediated 77 gun-involved conflicts, contributing to a 42% reduction in shootings in the City of Poughkeepsie target area.

Supporting Safe Re-Entry

We were awarded a contract to expand mental health and case management services at the Dutchess County Justice & Transition Center.

Preventing Domestic Violence Homicide

We trained over 95% of Dutchess County police officers in lethality assessment protocols to prevent domestic violence homicide.

Standing Against Sexual Assault

The Sexual Assault Response Team's "Swap the Shame, Shift the Blame" awareness campaign reached over 340,000 individuals.

Thanks to you, we made healing possible.

Promoting Mental Wellness

We provided mental health care for 5,036 people and expanded to include care management and walk-in appointments, while preparing to open children's services.

Ending Mental Health Stigma

Our mental health awareness campaign, "It's Time to Talk About Mental Health," reached over 600,000 individuals across the Hudson Valley.

Thanks to you, we helped children, teens, and families grow stronger.

Creating Safe Spaces for Children

We supported 2,038 children and parents, offering safe and engaging play while caregivers attended to court matters, and we opened a new site at the Ulster County Family Court.

Preventing Child Abuse

97.5% of families in our nurturing parenting program remained together safely, and we fulfilled over 1,200 concrete needs such as winter clothing, food, and diapers.

Preventing Substance Use

Our Ulster Prevention Council reached 6,049 students and adults through community outreach and prevention curricula taught in Ulster County schools.

Supporting Teen Leadership & Growth

Our Teen Program enhanced confidence-building, social-emotional learning, and connection under the leadership of a social worker, reaching 386 youth.

Thanks to you, we brought hope to our community.

Leading Collaboration & Improving Access

At the Family Partnership Center, community members accessed health care, legal services, nutritious food, financial literacy, education, and advocacy. Our community center hosted 247 events in 2025, providing over 13,600 people with resources, connection, and joy.

Because of you, Family Services continues to support everyone's right to safety, healing, growth, and hope — and everyone's right to thrive.

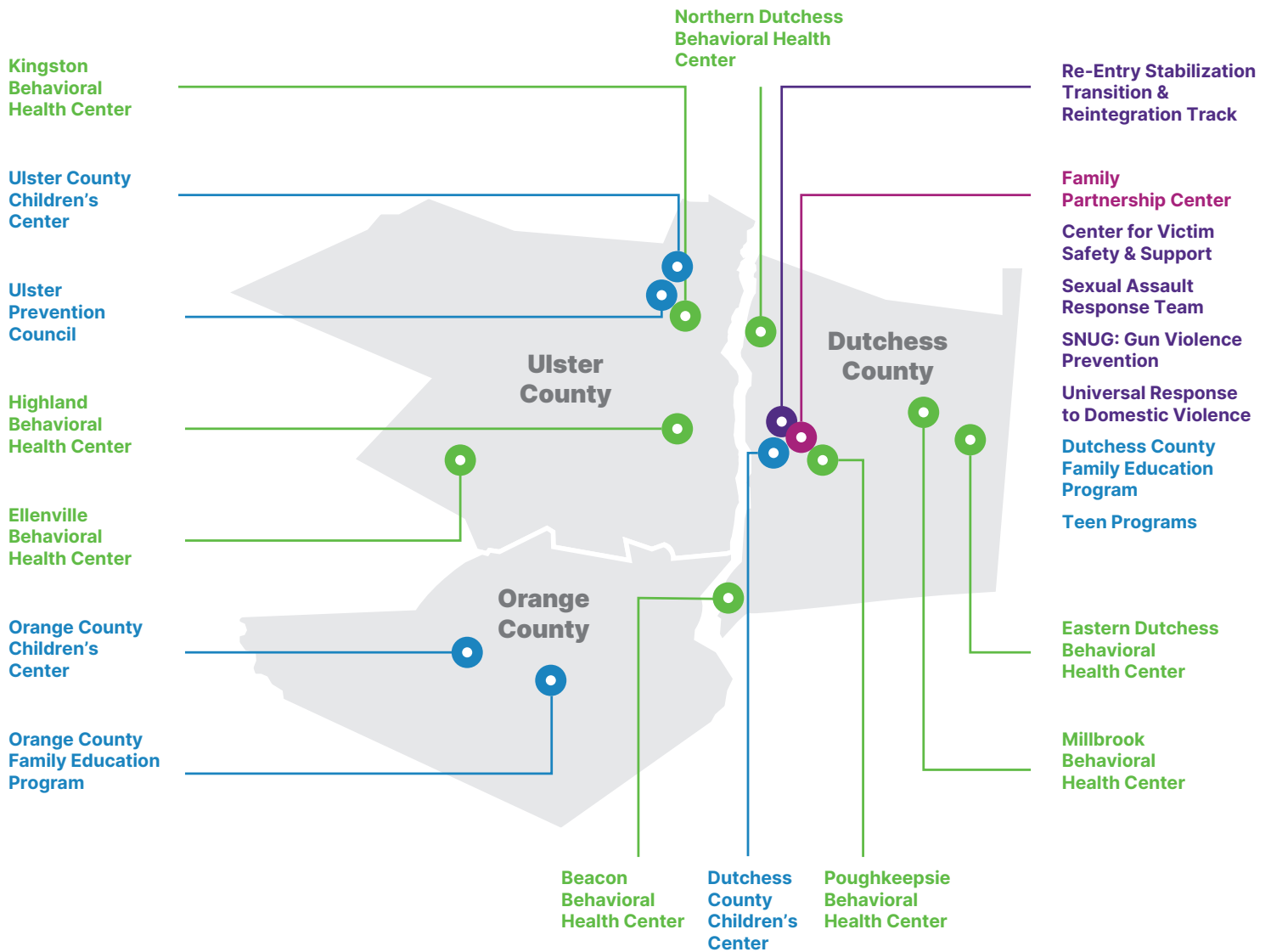

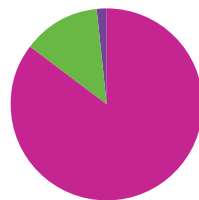

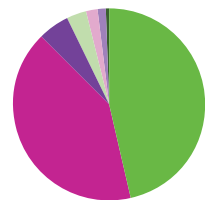
